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Process for reporting Non-Controlled Drug (CD) Community Pharmacy Incidents

All community pharmacy dispensing errors should be raised with the community pharmacy in the first instance to be resolved. Following this any non-CD Community Pharmacy dispensing errors or clinical issues should also be reported to the East Midlands Primary Care Team for follow up by completing the form located on the Medicines Optimisation Team website and returning it to england.eastmidspharmacy@nhs.net



Free Oral Health Training

Emollients & Fire Risk - Reminder

What is the risk?

Although emollients are not flammable themselves or when on the skin, they can transfer from the skin onto clothing, bedding, dressings, and other fabrics. Once there, they can dry onto the fabric, build up over time and act as an accelerant. In the presence of a naked flame or heat source, fabric with emollient dried on it is easily ignited and will significantly reduce the time available to put out a fire before serious and fatal burns are sustained. This risk applies to all emollients, including paraffin-free emollients.



What can you do?

Share resources and information with colleagues on the fire risk when using emollients.

- Advise service users who use emollients about the potential fire risks of smoking (or being near to people who are smoking), exposure to any open flame or other heat source.
- Ensure any advice given to service users is recorded in their care plan
- Recommend that service users change clothing and bedding regularly preferably daily. Washing
 clothing or fabric at a high temperature may reduce emollient build up but not totally remove it.
- Inform GP if service user smokes and is displaying memory issues and/or confusion.

- Report any fire incidents with emollients or other skin care products to the Yellow Card Scheme.

Monitored Dosage Systems (MDS)

The use of a Monitored Dosage System (MDS) is not considered best practice for medicines supply. Current guidance recommends the use of original packs as the gold standard. A pharmacist can provide tailored advice on suitable interventions to support individual service users in managing their medication. This may include recommending an MDS or another compliance aid where appropriate.

These aids are available free of charge to patients who meet the eligibility criteria under the Equality Act 2010, and community pharmacists are responsible for assessing eligibility. It is important to note that community pharmacies are under no obligation under the Equality Act to supply an MDS solely based on a request from a carer, particularly where paid carers are responsible for administering medication.

If a service user is assessed as ineligible, they or a relative may choose to privately fund the use of such a device, as the NHS does not routinely cover the cost of monitored dosage systems. Further information is available at
