Funding for Community Pharmacy Technician Apprenticeship Programme 2025

The information below is from the NHS England workforce pharmacy team. Please note the deadline **for funding applications is Sunday 15 June**

We are excited to announce the launch of the Community Pharmacy Technician Apprenticeship Programme 2025. More information can be found on this link; <u>Community</u> <u>Pharmacy Technician Apprenticeship Programme 2025</u>. This programme will support Pre-registration Trainee Pharmacy Technicians (PTPTs) to be employed and complete their 24-month apprenticeship training within a **community pharmacy setting**. Upon completion of training and registration with the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC) the registered pharmacy technicians' will be able to utilise their expertise and knowledge to support community pharmacies in various ways, including contributing to the delivery of pharmacy services and broader healthcare reforms.

Funding Offer

We are offering a training contribution of **£15,053 per trainee**, **per year for two years** (24 months) to support community pharmacies in developing a PTPT programme that meets the GPhC IET standards for pharmacy technicians (the link to view is here standards for the initial education and training of pharmacy technicians october 2017 1.pdf) and the NHS England Education Quality Framework (the link to view is here Education Quality Strategy and Framework | NHS England | Workforce, training and education).

Next Steps

Application for funding is through an expression of interest (EoI) submitted via an online application form which can be found here; <u>Community Pharmacy: Application for PTPT</u> <u>Training Contribution 2025</u>. The application window will open on Monday 19 May 2025 until Sunday 15 June 2025.

Oral Contraceptives and the Preferred Prescribing List

Prescribing medicines by their generic name is generally preferred in Primary Care but there are some circumstances when brand-name or branded generic prescribing is warranted.

The ICB has historically recommended some branded-generics and is in the process of moving to generic prescribing for all medicines, unless there is a clinical reason to prescribe by brand, or if there is a significant sustainable saving for the NHS by prescribing by brand name. Appropriate reasons for brand prescribing are listed in the Specialist Pharmacy Service (SPS) guidance which can be accessed here; <u>Prescribing by generic or brand name in primary care guidance</u>.

With the increasing uptake of the Pharmacy Contraception Service in Community Pharmacy setting it would be an appropriate a time to highlight the preferred brands of oral contraceptive medications that are recommended in the Nottinghamshire APC guidelines which can be accessed here on page 4 <u>preferred-brands_aide-memoire.pdf</u>.

Flu Antiviral Medication Update

Changes in the prescribing of antiviral medication in primary care have been announced as below.

The most recent surveillance data from UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) indicates

that circulation of influenza in the community has returned to baseline levels. In accordance with NICE guidance and Schedule 2 to the National Health Service (General Medical Services Contracts) (Prescription of drugs etc.) Regulations 2004), commonly known as the Grey List or Selected List Scheme (SLS):

- GPs and other prescribers working in primary care should no longer prescribe antiviral medicines (including neuraminidase inhibitors) for the prophylaxis and treatment of influenza on an FP10 prescription form.
- Community pharmacists should no longer supply antiviral medicines in primary care on presentation of an FP10 prescription form.

This advice stands until further notice. This does not impact on prescribing of antiviral medicines in hospitals, which can continue as normal.

Medication Supply Shortages

Medicines supply issues continue to be a daily battle for community pharmacy

This tool is updated weekly and lists medication shortages, discontinued medication, limited availability and anticipated resupply dates.

You can also sign up to receive a weekly email which provides a concise list of the changes that have occurred in the past 7 days.
